David Niels Georgesen, age 86, of McCutchanville, Indiana, died on June 29th, 2024.

David was born in Ardmore, Oklahoma on August 7th, 1937 to Mabel (Matthews) and Niels Georgesen. A member of the Bosse class of 1955, David graduated from the University of Evansville with a Bachelor of Science in Business and pursued a career in mechanical engineering. David and Sallie Ahles married on December 24th, 1961, and together they had two children.

David served in the Army and Air Force Reserves, and worked as an engineer and manager retiring from Accuride and working in his retirement years at Wink Construction. David was a Kentucky Colonel, and was a part of the McCutchanville Community Association for many years. David will be remembered as a long-time McCutchanville Volunteer Fire Fighter and was a first responder as the acting Fire Chief at the plane crash carrying the University of Evansville basketball team in 1977.
